Fund Updates: The latest fund update for the Scheme was made available on 28 April 2017 and is for the guarter ended 31 March 2017.

Financial statements and auditor's report: The Scheme's latest financial statements and accompanying auditor's report were for the accounting period 20 November 2015 to 31 December 2016 (Accounting Period). They were lodged with the Registrar on 28 April 2017.

The Auditor's Report did not refer to any fundamental uncertainty and nor was it qualified or modified in any respect.

2. Information on contributions and Scheme participants

The Scheme was launched at the beginning of the Accounting Period on 20 November 2015, with the first investment placed on 22 January 2016.

At launch, the Scheme offered one investment fund with two investment portfolios: A Balanced Portfolio and a Cash Portfolio. The investment fund was unchanged and there remains only one investment fund at the end of the Accounting Period.

The Scheme transitioned to the regime under the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013 (**FMCA**) with an effective date of 13 May 2016.

On 12 May 2016 the Trust Deed was amended by the Supervisor and the Manager as a consequence of the passage of the FMCA and the repeal of the Unit Trusts Act 1960. This enabled the Scheme to transition to the regime under the FMCA.

Changes to the Statement of Investment Policy and Objectives (SIPO)

There were no material changes to the Scheme's SIPO during the Accounting Period.

1. General information

Reporting Entities

These financial statements are for the period ended 31 December 2016 and have been prepared for the Lifetime Income Fund ("the Fund"). The Lifetime Income Fund is registered as a Managed Investment Scheme in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013 and consists of two portfolios, the Lifetime Income Fund Balanced Portfolio ("Balanced Portfolio") and the Lifetime Income Fund Cash Portfolio ("Cash Portfolio"). Each Portfolio has separate assets and liabilities governed by the terms of the Trust Deed for the purpose of calculating net asset value and issuing and redeeming units. Portfolios are not separate trust funds. The Fund commenced operation on 22 January 2016.

The principal activity of the Fund is investment, either via investments in other managed funds or holding investments directly.

The objectives of the Fund is as follows:

- * The Balanced Portfolio invests in low cost index funds or similar investments with underlying exposure to shares and fixed interest securities in New Zealand and internationally. Its investment objective is to deliver a target return of 6.5% p.a. before fees and taxes over the long term and limit volatility to no more than 7.5% over the long term.
- * The Cash Portfolio invests in cash and short term fixed interest investments. It's purpose is to pay commitments such as the Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit, fees and expenses.

The Fund's investment activities are managed by Lifetime Asset Management Limited (the 'Manager'). The registered office for Lifetime Asset Management Limited, Floor 5, 50-64 Customhouse Quay, Wellington Central, Wellington, 6011, New Zealand.

These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Board of Directors of the Manager on 28 April 2017.

Statutory Base

The Fund is a Managed Investment Scheme as defined by the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013 and is subject to the provisions of that Act. The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013, the Financial Reporting Act 2013, and the Trust Deed.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these Financial Statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied throughout the period presented, unless otherwise stated.

These financial statements have been prepared for the period from 20 November 2015, the date of establishment to 31 December 2016. Given this is the Fund's first period of operations, no comparative figures have been prepared.

2.1 Basis of preparation

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in New Zealand (NZ GAAP). For the purposes of complying with NZ GAAP, the Fund is a for-profit entity. These Financial Statements comply with New Zealand equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (NZ IFRS) and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). These Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost method, except for financial assets and liabilities held at fair value through profit or loss.

The preparation of Financial Statements in conformity with NZ IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires the Directors of the Manager to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the Financial Statements are disclosed in Note 3.

Standards and amendments to existing standards effective 1 April 2016 impacting the Fund

Amendments to NZ IAS 1 'Presentation of financial statements' (effective for periods commencing on or after 1 January 2016). The amendments clarify guidance on materiality and aggregation, the presentation of subtotals, the structure of financial statements and the disclosures of accounting policies. The amendments form part of the IASB's Disclosure Initiative, which explores how financial statement disclosures can be improved. Upon adopting the new amendment for the period ended 31 December 2016, the Manager reviewed the financial statements and incorporated the requirements of the standard.

Standards and amendments to existing standards that are relevant, but not yet applicable to the Fund and have not been early adopted by the Fund.

NZ IFRS 9 Financial instruments ('NZ IFRS 9') (effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018). NZ IFRS 9 requires financial assets to be classified on the basis of the business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset, and subsequently measures the financial assets as either at amortised cost or fair value. The requirements for classifying and measuring financial liabilities have been added to the standard and were carried forward largely unchanged from NZ IAS 39 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement. However, the requirements related to the fair value option for financial liabilities were changed to address the issue of own credit risk. The new hedge accounting model more closely aligns hedge accounting with risk management activities undertaken by entities when hedging their financial and non-financial risks. NZ IFRS 9 introduces a new expected credit loss model for calculating impairment of financial assets. The impact of adopting NZ IFRS 9, has not yet been fully assessed, however it is not expected to have a significant impact on the Fund's reported result or financial position. The Fund intends to adopt NZ IFRS 9 for its financial period commencing 1 January 2018.

2.2 Financial instruments

(a) Classification

The Fund's investments are categorised as financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. This is comprised of the following:

Financial instruments held for trading

A financial asset or financial liability is classified as held for trading if it is acquired or incurred principally for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term. Derivatives are categorised as held for trading. All derivatives in a net receivable or payable position are shown gross and reported as either derivative financial assets or derivative financial liabilities. The Fund does not designate any derivatives as hedges in a hedging relationship. The Balanced Portfolio entered into exchange traded foreign exchange futures contracts which have been classified as held for trading.

Financial instruments designated at fair value through profit or loss upon initial recognition

Financial instruments designated at fair value through profit or loss at inception are those that are managed and their performance evaluated on a fair value basis in accordance with the Fund's documented investment strategy. The Fund's policy is for the Investment Manager to evaluate the information about these financial instruments on a fair value basis together with other related financial information.

The financial instruments comprise of exchange traded equities and unlisted trusts.

The designation of financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss is consistent with the Fund's risk management or investment strategy.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables comprise of interest earned that has not been paid by the end of the accounting period, dividends and distributions receivable, receivables on unsettled trades, other receivables, margin cash accounts and cash and cash equivalents.

Financial liabilities at amortised cost

Financial liabilities at amortised cost are non-derivative financial liabilities with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Financial liabilities at amortised cost consist of a related party loan discounted to reflect fair value at inception and subsequently measured at amortised cost.

(b) Recognition, derecognition and measurement

The Fund recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date they become parties to the contractual agreement (trade date). Financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or the Fund has transferred substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership. A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Subsequent to initial recognition, all financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value. Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss category are presented in the Statements of Comprehensive Income within net changes in fair value of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

(c) Fair value estimation

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Fair value in an active market

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in active markets (such a publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the reporting date. The quoted market price used by the Fund are the last traded market price for both financial assets and financial liabilities where the last traded prices falls within the bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, management will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of fair value. The quoted market price used for fixed interest securities is the current mid price.

Fair value in an inactive or unquoted market

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques. The Fund uses a variety of methods and make assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each balance date. Valuation techniques used include the use of recent comparable arm's length market transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and other valuation techniques commonly used by market participants making the maximum use of market inputs and relying as little as possible on entity-specific inputs.

The Fund's investments in other funds are subject to the terms and conditions of the respective funds' offering documentation. The investments in other funds are primarily valued based on the latest available redemption price of such units, as determined by the other funds' administrators. The Fund reviews the details of the reported information obtained from the other funds and consider: the liquidity of the other fund or its underlying investments; the value date of the net asset value provided; and restrictions on redemptions; and the basis of accounting and, in instances where the basis of accounting is other than fair value, fair valuation information is obtained from the other funds' advisors.

The rights of the Fund to request redemption of its investments in other funds may vary in frequency from daily to weekly redemptions. As a result, the carrying values of the other funds may not be indicative of the values ultimately realised on redemption. In addition, the Fund may be materially affected by the actions of other investors who have invested in other funds in which the Fund has invested.

If necessary, the Fund makes adjustments to the net asset value of various other fund investments to obtain the best estimate of fair value. Other net changes in fair value on financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss in the Statements of Comprehensive Income include the change in fair value of each other fund.

2.3 Offsetting financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Balance Sheet when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

2.4 Net assets attributable to Unitholders

Units in the Fund are redeemable at the Unitholders' option and do not have identical features and are classified as financial liabilities. Redemption may take place at the redemption price on any business day after appropriate notice. The fair value of redeemable units is measured at the redemption amount that is payable (based on the redemption unit price) at the balance date if Unitholders exercised their right to put the units back to the Fund. As stipulated in the Trust Deed, each unit represents a right to an individual share in the respective Portfolio and does not extend a right in the underlying assets of the Portfolio.

The Fund will redeem units, based on the redemption unit price, to pay the Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit to investors during the protected income base phase as set out in the offering documents.

Applications received for units in the Fund are recorded net of any entry fees payable prior to the issue of units in the Fund and any initial service fee (if any). Redemptions from the Fund are recorded gross of any exit fees payable after the cancellation of the units redeemed. Units are issued and redeemed at the holder's option at prices based on the net asset value per unit at the time of issue or redemption. The net asset value per unit is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to Unitholders with the total number of outstanding units. In accordance with the provisions of the offering documents, investment positions are valued based at the appropriate market value for the purpose of determining the net asset value per unit for subscriptions and redemptions.

2.5 Margin Account

Cash collateral provided by the Fund is identified in the balance sheet as margin accounts and is not included as a component of cash and cash equivalents. The Balanced Portfolio trades foreign exchange future derivative contracts and holds a margin account as collateral with the broker.

2.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks. Payments and receipts relating to the purchase and sale of investment securities are classified as cash flows from operating activities, as movements in the fair value of these securities represents the main income generating activity of the Fund.

2.7 Investment income

Interest income

Interest earned on loans and receivables, including cash and cash equivalents and the margin accounts are included as Interest income in the Statements of Comprehensive Income on an accruals basis.

Dividend and distribution income

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date with any related foreign withholding tax recorded in the Statements of Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders as a unitholder tax liability. Trust distributions are recognised on a present entitlement basis.

Net gains and losses on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Realised and unrealised gains and losses are reflected in the Statements of Comprehensive Income as net gain/(loss) on financial instruments held at fair value through profit or loss.

Unrealised gains or losses include the change in net market value of investments held as at balance date. Realised gains or losses are calculated based on the gross sale proceeds and the weighted average cost of the investments sold.

2.8 Receivables

Receivables may include amounts for interest, dividends and rebates receivable and amounts due from brokers for securities sold that have been contracted for but not yet delivered by the end of the accounting period. Receivables are initially recognised at fair value, being the amounts receivable. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost, being the initially recognised amount reduced for impairment as appropriate. Any impairment charge is recognised in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

2.9 Payables

These amounts represent liabilities and accrued expenses owing by the Fund at period end and may include related party fees and amounts due to brokers for securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet delivered by the period end. These amounts are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently stated at amortised cost.

2.10 Expenses

All expenses, including the Fund's management fees, are recognised in the Statements of Comprehensive Income on an accruals basis.

2.11 Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign currency assets and liabilities are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rate prevailing at the Balance Sheet date.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from translation are included in the Statements of Comprehensive Income.

Foreign exchange gains and losses relating to cash and cash equivalents are presented in the Statements of Comprehensive Income within 'net foreign currency gains or losses on cash and cash equivalents'.

Foreign exchange gains and losses relating to the financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value through profit or loss are presented in the Statements of Comprehensive Income within 'other net changes in fair value on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss'.

2.12 Income tax

The Fund qualifies as and has elected to be a Portfolio Investment Entity (PIE) for tax purposes. Under the PIE regime income is effectively taxed in the hands of the Unitholders and therefore the Fund has no income tax expense. Accordingly, no income tax expense is recognised in the Statements of Comprehensive Income. Income is disclosed gross of any resident and foreign withholding taxes deducted at source and the taxes are included in Unitholder tax liabilities in the Statements of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders.

Under the PIE regime, the Manager attributes the taxable income of the Fund to Unitholders in accordance with the proportion of their interest in the Fund. The income attributed to each Unitholder is taxed at the Unitholder's "prescribed investor rate" which is capped at 28% on redemptions and annually at 31 March each year.

Unitholder tax liabilities disclosed in the Statements of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders consists of withdrawals to meet Unitholder tax liabilities under the PIE regime and any resident and foreign withholding taxes deducted at source.

2.13 Lifetime withdrawal benefit

Under the Trust Deed, Unitholders are entitled to elect to receive a regular lifetime withdrawal benefit ("Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit") as disclosed in the Statements of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders. This is funded in the first instance from the Unitholder's protected income base and subsequently from the insurance policy held by the Supervisor on behalf of Unitholders with Lifetime Income Limited. The Fund does not expect to make distributions from the Fund apart from the Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit.

2.14 Insurance payments

The Fund pays insurance premiums to Lifetime Income Limited on behalf of Unitholders. These premiums are calculated daily and paid monthly from the Cash Portfolio as disclosed in the Statements of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders.

2.15 Goods and services tax ("GST")

The Fund is not registered for GST. The Statements of Comprehensive Income and Statements of Cash Flows have been prepared so that all components are stated inclusive of GST. All items in the Balance Sheet are stated inclusive of GST.

3. Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The Manager of the Fund makes estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities are outlined below. Estimates are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience among other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fair value of securities not quoted in an active market

The valuation models employed use observable data, to the extent practicable. However, areas such as credit risk, volatilities and correlations require management to make estimates. Changes in assumptions about these factors could affect the reported fair value of financial instruments.

The fair value of investments in other funds have been fair valued in accordance with the policies set out above. For certain other financial instruments, including amounts due from/to brokers, accounts payable and accrued expenses, the carrying amounts approximate fair value due to the short term nature of these financial instruments.

Functional currency

The Manager considers the New Zealand dollar the currency that most faithfully represents the economic effect of the underlying transactions, events and conditions. The New Zealand dollar is the currency in which the Fund measures it's performance and reports it's results, as well as the currency in which the Fund receives subscriptions from investors.

Fair value of related party loan at initial measurement

The fair value of the interest free related party loan is calculated based on a 10 year discounted cash flow which reflects the period over which the establishment costs incurred by the Manager are expected to be recovered from the Fund. The discount rate used was 2.98% based on the NZ Treasury 10 year risk free discount rate at 30 June 2016.

4. Derivative financial instruments

Foreign exchange futures

Futures are contractual obligations to buy or sell instruments on a future date at a specified price established in an organised market. The fair value of the future is based on the amount that will be paid or received to settle the obligation on a net basis on the exchange. A foreign exchange future is a futures contract to exchange one currency for another at a specified date in the future at a price (exchange rate) that is fixed on the purchase date.

5. Financial risk management

5.1 Financial risk factors

The Fund's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including currency risk, cash flow and fair value interest rate risk and price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk. The Fund's overall risk management programme focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the Fund's financial performance.

The Fund is also indirectly exposed to risk factors such as credit risk and interest rate risk via it's investments in unlisted unit trusts. However the risk management note outlined below are not prepared on a look through basis.

The Manager uses different methods to measure and manage the various types of risk to which it is exposed; these methods are explained below.

5.1.1 Market risk

(a) Price risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of non-monetary financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market prices, whether those changes are caused by factors specific to an issuer or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market. All equity, unit trust and unlisted investments present a risk of loss of capital often due to factors beyond the Manager's control such as competition, regulatory changes, commodity price changes and changes in general economic climate both domestically and internationally. The Manager moderates this risk through careful stock selection and diversification, daily monitoring of the Fund's market position and adherence to the Fund's investment policies.

Where non-monetary financial instruments, for example, unlisted trusts are denominated in currencies other than New Zealand dollars, the price initially expressed in foreign currency and then converted into New Zealand dollars will also fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The foreign exchange exposure relating to non-monetary assets and liabilities is considered to be a component of market price risk and not foreign exchange risk.

The table below summarises the sensitivity of the Fund's net assets attributable to Unitholders to movements in prices, as at 31 December. If prices for the Fund's investments had increased or decreased by 5% with all other variables held constant, this would have had the following impact on the Statements of Comprehensive Income and Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders:

(b) Foreign exchange risk

Foreign currency risk, as defined in NZ IFRS 7, 'Financial Instruments: Disclosures', arises as the value of future transactions, recognised monetary assets and monetary liabilities denominated in other currencies fluctuate due to changes in foreign exchange rates. NZ IFRS 7 considers the foreign exchange exposure relating to non-monetary assets and liabilities to be a component of market price risk not foreign currency risk.

The Fund may enter into foreign exchange derivatives to hedge the foreign currency risk implicit in the value of the portfolio securities denominated in foreign currency. As the nature of these contracts is to manage the international investment activities, they are accounted for by marking to market at balance date in a manner consistent with the valuation of the underlying securities.

(c) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk arises from the effects of fluctuations in the prevailing levels of market interest rates on the fair value of financial assets and liabilities and future cash flow.

* Cash flow interest rate risk

The Fund holds cash and cash equivalents in New Zealand dollars that expose the Fund to cash flow interest rate risk. A change in interest rates impacts the cash flow of the Fund's cash and cash equivalents by increasing or decreasing the amount of interest received. A variable of 100 basis points (1%) was selected as this is a reasonably expected movement based on past overnight cash rate movements. The one year cash flow sensitivity to a 100 basis point movement in interest rates (based on assets held at reporting date), with all other variables held constant, is shown in the following table:

5.1.2 Credit risk

Credit risk is the potential risk of financial loss resulting from the failure of counterparties to honour fully the terms and conditions of a contract with the Fund. Financial instruments that subject the Fund to credit risk consist primarily of cash equivalents and trade and other receivables. All transactions in listed securities are settled/paid for upon delivery using approved brokers. The risk of default is considered minimal, as delivery of securities sold is only made once the broker has received payment. Payment is made on a purchase once the securities have been received by the broker. The trade will fail if either party fails to meet its obligation. The maximum credit risk of financial instruments is considered to be the carrying amount on the statement of financial position. The risk of non-recovery of financial assets is considered minimal due to the counterparties dealt with. The Fund does not require collateral or other security to support financial instruments with credit risk. The Fund invests cash with banks registered in New Zealand which carry a minimum short term credit rating of AA- (Standard & Poor's). The Fund is indirectly exposed to credit risk through it's investments in unlisted trusts.

5.1.3 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund may not be able to generate sufficient cash resources to settle it's obligations in full as they fall due or can only do so on terms that are materially disadvantageous.

The Fund is exposed to daily redemptions of units. Liquidity risk is managed by holding liquid investments to enable the Fund to meet liabilities as they fall due and withdrawals when requested. The Fund's investment policies do not state a minimum required level of investment in liquid investments. The Fund's financial liabilities consist of trade and other payables and foreign exchange futures contracts which are short term in nature and classified as a current liability at reporting date. The current fair value represents the estimated cash flow that may be required to dispose of the positions. Future cash flows of the Fund and realised liabilities may differ from current liabilities based on future changes in market conditions.

Where the Fund invests into unlisted trusts, those underlying funds allow for daily withdrawals to match the Fund's withdrawal policy. However, underlying funds may be subject to discretionary withdrawal restrictions exercisable by the underlying manager, including the ability to suspend withdrawals or withhold varying amounts of any withdrawal requested.

5.2 Capital risk management

The Fund's capital is represented by the net assets attributable to Unitholders. The amount of net assets attributable to unitholders can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily applications and withdrawals which are at the discretion of Unitholders.

If a redemption request or a series of redemption requests in respect of the Fund are received within a period of 60 business days that in total comprise more than 10% of the number of units on issue in the Balanced Portfolio, and the Manager determines it is in the interest of the Fund's Unitholders to defer immediate redemption of the total Units requested, the Manager will determine a basis for redemption that it considers to be in the general interests of all the Fund's Unitholders.

Unitholders are entitled to elect to receive a Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit. Unitholders protected income base will be used to calculate the Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit as determined by an actuary and as disclosed in the offering documentation.

In accordance with the Trust Deed, if all units have been redeemed, the Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit will be paid from monies received under the insurance policy held by the Supervisor with Lifetime Income Limited.

The Manager may suspend redemptions where the Manager, in good faith, forms the opinion that it is not practicable, or would be materially prejudicial to the interests of Unitholders of the Fund for the Supervisor to realise assets or borrow in order to permit redemption of units.

The Fund does not have any externally imposed capital requirements. Units may be redeemed on any business day subject to the receipt of the redemption request.

The redemption price of the Fund at 31 December 2016 differs from the total net assets of the Fund divided by the units in the Statements of Financial Position. The difference reflects amounts included in the financial statements to comply with IFRS which do not form part of the daily unit price. These include recognition of redemption price on underlying assets, re-classification of cash outstanding for contributions received at balance date and accrued establishment costs, audit fees, administration and supervisor fees paid by the Manager. In accordance with the Fund documents, the Manager will reclaim these accrued costs from the Fund at which stage they will be included in the daily unit price.

Neither the Supervisor, the Manager, or any other party guarantee the units offered by the Fund, the performance or returns of the Fund or the repayment of capital.

5.3 Fair value estimation

All financial assets and financial liabilities included in the Balance Sheets, are carried at amounts that represent or approximate fair value. The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the period end date. The quoted market price used for financial assets held by the Fund is the last traded price. The price used for unlisted unit trusts is the published withdrawal price.

A financial instrument is regarded as quoted in an active market if quoted prices are readily and regularly available from an exchange, dealer, broker, industry group, pricing service, or regulatory agency, and those prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis.

NZ IFRS 13 requires the Fund to classify fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

- * Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1).
- * Inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (level 2).
- * Inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (level 3).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety. If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that require significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a level 3 measurement.

The determination of what constitutes 'observable' requires significant judgement by the Manager. The Manager considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.

10. Related parties

10.1 Key management and key management personnel

Lifetime Asset Management Limited is the Manager of the Lifetime Income Fund. The Manager is paid an annual management fee of 0.7% of the gross asset value of the Fund (across both Portfolios). From this fee, the Manager pays the fees of Milliman and other investment specialists. Management fees are calculated on the daily gross asset values of the Fund and paid monthly. Management fees are shown in the Statements of Comprehensive Income under "Management fees". Management fees payable are shown in the Balance Sheets.

The Fund has an interest free related party loan from Lifetime Asset Management in relation to establishment costs paid by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. Establishment costs will be recovered from the Fund monthly in arrears over an estimated 10 year period, commencing April 2017.

The loan is interest free and has accordingly been discounted to reflect fair value at inception date. The loan is subsequently measured at amortised cost. The discount amount processed will be released as a financing charge to the Statements of Comprehensive Income over the next 10 year period.

Public Trust is as the Supervisor and Custodian of the Fund paid an annual fee of 0.08% per annum of the aggregate gross asset value of the Fund (across both Portfolios), subject to a \$25,000 annual minimum and is calculated on the daily gross asset values of the Fund and paid monthly. Custody fees are included in the monthly fee paid to the Supervisor. In addition to its monthly fee, the Supervisor is entitled to charge a special fee to the Fund as may be agreed with the Manager on a time, costs and disbursements basis. Fees paid to the Supervisor are included under "Supervisor Fees" in the Statements of Comprehensive Income. Supervisor fees payable are shown in the Balance Sheets.

Management fee rebates received by the Fund as disclosed in the Statements of Comprehensive Income are from non-related investment managers of underlying funds into which the Fund invests. Management fee rebates receivable are shown in the Balance Sheets.

Lifetime Income Limited provides Unitholders insurance cover for the Lifetime Withdrawal Benefit. The Fund pays insurance premiums on behalf of investors, to Lifetime Income Limited, based on 1.35% per annum of the protected income base (as set out in the offering documents) for each investor. These premiums are calculated daily and paid monthly from the Cash Portfolio as disclosed in the Statements of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders.
